NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS: LAW, GOVERNANCE, AND ETHICS UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA LAW SCHOOL JOHN M. BRADLEY LAW --- ---

Course Description

This course examines the rationales, structures, and controversies related to nonprofit organizations and philanthropy in the United States. We will examine:

- The roles of nonprofit organizations as posited by economic, political, and historical vantage points;
- The legal purposes and framework of these organizations—including the advantages of the nonprofit form (e.g. whether tax-exemption is justified) and the restrictions on the type of commercial and political activity in which they can engage; and
- The controversies surrounding the nonprofit sector, with particular emphasis on the ethics of giving, the oversight roles played by boards of directors, state authorities, and federal regulators, and questions of accountability and performance.

Learning Outcomes

- Demonstrate an understanding of the legal structure of charitable organizations in the United States along with an appreciation of how theory and historical development have impacted these structures.
- Demonstrate an understanding of major ethical issues related to the nonprofit sector and be positioned to engage in current debates.
- Contribute a rigorous analysis of a particular legal, ethical, and/or governance issue impacting nonprofits.

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Grading

The course grade will be based on an End of Course Paper (50%) + In-class Article Submissions (30%) + Class Participation (20%).

Paper: Write a 20 page research paper on an issue of your choice (subject to my approval). I am always happy to discuss possible topics. Due Monday, April ____.

In-class Article Submissions: Discuss two articles during selected classes over the course of the semester.

- One article must be from an academic source: a journal/law review article or book chapter. One article must be from a popular source, such as a news report.

- This is not a formal presentation; rather, you should identify an article that would enhance the discussion during two classes and lead a discussion. You should summarize salient points in the articles and pose relevant points and/or questions for the class to consider.
- The article should be emailed to me before or within a day after class; no submission written by the student is expected.

Class Participation: Class participation is a vital aspect of the course. To receive the maximum number of available points, you must meaningfully contribute to each class discussion.
